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
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C **House approves probation overhaul**
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The Massachusetts House unanimously passed a bill intended to eliminate parole in the state Probation Department, but rejected Governor Deval Patrick's demand that he be given control of the troubled agency. [MORE](#)

C **First inmate graduates from faith-based re-entry program**

A new pilot program at Wasikwood Correctional Center in Kenai, Alaska works with inmates who volunteer for the program and who have a minimum of six months to serve. The in-prison peace centers on a Christian education course, along with a substance abuse recovery program and sessions on life and job skills. Inmate had the capacity to house 18 inmates in the program. All the participants live on the same floor to create a sense of community and accountability. [MORE](#)

C **Prison recidivism stats improve**

Significantly fewer felons who participate in specialized treatment and rehabilitation programs are returning to prison within three years, a new study made public this morning shows. In only one of eight programs—a relatively small, pre-release substance-abuse treatment initiative—did the recidivism rate increase in three years, by just 1 percent, according to study by the Texas Department of Criminal Justice.
